


## Ronald Suiter CAS Student Travel Prize



# BLACK History MONTH

The ENVS Program is proud to celebrate Black History Month by recognizing exceptional environmentalists who have made a positive impact on the world. We encourage you to take time to learn about Black history to gain a deeper understanding of the challenges Black communities have faced and the invaluable contributions they have made to society.

Here are some ways to educate yourself on Black history:

Read: Explore books by Black authors or learn about influential
Black figures, including local heroes, activists, scientists, and
inventors.

**Listen**: Tune into podcasts or explore the rich history of Black music.

Visit: Experience Black history firsthand by visiting a Black or African American history museum.

Support: Uplift Black-owned businesses and Black-led nonprofits.

Reflect: Examine your own conscious and unconscious biases.

Celebrate: Honor and appreciate the past and present achievements of the Black community.

Carolyn Finney is a storyteller, author and a cultural geographer who is deeply interested in issues related to identitu. difference, creativity, and resilience. She currently serves as Artist-in-Resident for Environmental Affairs at Middleburu College. The aim of her work is to develop greater cultural competency within environmental organizations and institutions, challenge media outlets on their representation of difference, and increase awareness of how privilege shapes who gets to speak to environmental issues and determine policu and action. Her must-read first book is Black Faces, White Spaces: Reimagining the Relationship of African Americans to the Great Outdoors.





Leah Penniman is a Black Kreyol farmer, mother, self-described soil nerd, author, and food justice activist. She co-founded Soul Fire Farm in Grafton, New York, in 2010 with the mission to end racism in the food system and reclaim ancestral connection to land. As Co-Executive Director and Farm Director, Penniman is part of a team that facilitates powerful food sovereignty programs—including farmer training for Black and Brown people, a subsidized farm food distribution program, and domestic and international organizing toward equity in the food system.

Dr. Wangari Maathai was a Kenyan scholar and an internationally recognize environmental and human rights activist. In 1977. She founded the Green Belt Movement which introduced the idea of planting trees to help conserve the environment. However, the Green Belt Movement does more than plant trees: they work with local communities to hire women's groups to plant the trees in an effort to not only improve the local environment but improve the lives of the people living in it. This holistic approach to this sustainability project has led Green Belt Movement to be incrediblu successful having planted over 51 million trees to date.





The great-granddaughter of Florida's first Black millionaire, A.L. Lewis, gave up a career in the opera to preserve the environment. MaVunee Betsch "The Beach Lady" was devoted to an African-American beach known as American Beach on Amelia island. Florida, that A.L. Lewis had created during the Jim Crow era to provide a respite for Blacks who weren't allowed on other beaches. According to an article, "Her hair, coiffed into a wheel over her head, cascades in graying dreadlocks down her back and past her ankles. Her hair and clothes are festooned with political buttons, unfailingly radical and generally funny, most expressing her commitment to social and racial justice, ecological causes and vegetarianism.
