The College of Arts & Sciences Internship Fund was created in 2015 to provide funding to students pursuing unpaid or underpaid summer internships. This funding allows students to participate in educational internship opportunities in their chosen fields rather than accepting summer jobs and helps create equity among students with diverse income levels.

Application & Selection Process:

Students apply for funding via CAS's central internship scholarship process to ensure that they are considered for the maximum amount of funding available. Each student submits a budget sheet detailing their summer expenses, a description of their internship, and responses to several short answer questions about their future goals. The selection committee is comprised of College and Department employees.
