TICK PROTECTION PLAN

Tick-borne diseases are on the rise across northern New England. If you live, work and recreate near prime tick habitat, you and your animals are at high risk for bites and contracting an illness. Ticks are managed using an integrated approach. This is achieved by practicing several of the strategies below. This checklist will help you plan to protect yourself, your family, staff, pets and livestock. It will also direct you to where you can find information about ticks and their management.
